

EDUCATION NIGHT



Glen Perry was the speaker for June's education night on Tuesday, June 20th. Glen is a member of a Desert Team—one of twenty six search and rescue units under the direction of the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Search and Rescue Division. Glen's unit is based in the Victor Valley.

Glen spoke to members about desert survival and gave us a quiz that showed a survival scenario. Members were prompted to make choices about what items to use and we were asked to rank their importance. Glen brought several packs he used on search and rescue missions and he explained the uses of each item he carried. However, his underlying theme was one of preparation and notification. He stressed we tell someone exactly where we go and what time we're expected to return. He also suggested going out with a partner, and carrying water and appropriate

survival gear. As we move into summer, Glen's talk was both timely and informative. He spoke for about an hour and was applauded by the membership.
