

Caution, beyond this point the road paralleling the RR tracks deteriorates and it will be difficult to turn around. At the Lavic Dry lake road turn right and travel O. 7 miles. At the indicated mileage, turn right and go 0.2 miles until an extremely large, flat, and cleared area is seen on the **RIGHT**. This is the camp site. This road DOES NOT GO THROUGH and it will be extremely difficult to turn a long travel trailer at the end. This route was checked on Sept 16 and was found in VERY good condition. Conditions at the site are for easy to difficult hiking and material is available within 100 yards of the vehicles. Material is on the surface. Physical dangers include snakes and other normal desert conditions. There is no age limit for this trip. All children are expected to be under constant supervision by parents or guardians at all times. Any child climbing on the exposed cliffs will result in both child and guardians being asked to leave the site. The trip leaders recommend that you bring gloves, spray bottle (water), rock pick, lunch, safety glasses, and adequate drinking water in ADDITION TO CAMPING GEAR. Alcoholic beverages will be permitted only in the evening at the camp site. You are responsible for cleaning up all trash before SUNSHINE REPORT you leave.



Victor Valley Gem and Mineral Club Overnight Field Trip to Lavic Siding

October 6, and 7, 2007 Dates: Time: 9 AM Meeting Location: Lavic Siding Camp Site (see below for directions) ((Both Days)) Wagon Master: Janet Flecher

This trip will be for Jasper and Chalcedony. Lavic Siding Jasper and Jasp-Agate are considered amongst the best Jaspers in the Mojave Desert. The trip on Saturday is suitable for all medium clearance two wheel drive vehicles. The location of Sunday's trip is to be determined. Sunday's trip will most likely require a 4x4. If you do not have a 4×4, please do not place both yourself and others at risk by insisting that you "can drive in the desert as well as any 4x4". The simple truth is that you can't. The trip leader is <u>NOT</u> responsible for getting you out if you get stuck. Only you can decide what is safe for your equipment and your driving ability.

The trip leader (and others) are planning on setting up camp on Friday. If you arrive early, please leave adequate room for others to maneuver and park their rigs. This is a huge camp site; however we have no way of knowing how many campers there will be or what equipment they will have. Please set up your rig as far back as possible to allow room for others who may be arriving after dark. This site is suitable for tent camping. Please note, there are no water, shade, firewood, or bathroom facilities at this site. This is a wilderness desert camp site. You are responsible for bringing *EVERYTHING* you need, so if you don't have it, don't expect others to help. Gas, food, BATHROOMS, and etc. are available in Ludlow.

Directions to Camping site: From Victorville, take I-15 to Barstow. In Barstow take I-40 East about 35 miles to the Hector Road exit. This is about 3 miles past the rest stop. At the stop sign at the end of the I-40 ramp turn right about 300 feet to the stop sign at the National Trails Highway. At the National Trails Highway turn left (east) for 6.8 miles. At this point you will be at a road level crossing for the RR tracks. **BEFORE** crossing the tracks, turn right and travel 2.2 miles of graded dirt road that parallels the RR tracks to the Lavic Dry Lake Road.

SAW #5-THE COVINGTON
