



Lapidary is a process. First we "discover" the rock (or we horsetrade for it with someone). The next step in the process is to cut the rock into slabs—it's a lot like slicing bread. For this part of the process we generally use one of the rock saws at the club house.

Once this step is done, we inspect the slab. We already have it in mind what we want from the slab. Satisfied that a particular slab meets the criteria we have in mind, we stencil a shape on it, cut it, polish it and turn a once nondescript rock into a thing of beauty. The slab featured on the front cover is a piece of Strawberry Onyx. Although it's in black and white here, it's in color on the website.

ROCK OF THE MONTH

Picasso Marble

Ruby in Zoisite, Chrysanthemum stone and Malachite are just a few of the crystals that have beautiful abstract patterns in them. Another of these crystals. one that has a broad spectrum of colors to its palette is Picasso Marble.

The colors of Picasso Marble can vary from brown, black, to cream and various shades of gray and can have abstract landscape patterns through out.

Picasso Marble goes by a few names, Picasso Jasper and Picasso Stone, these are the most popular names. Picasso is a metamorphic lime stone, Metamorphosis is one of three different ways rocks are formed (igneous and sedimentary are the other two).

Picasso Marble is found in Utah, it is a soft stone by most standards 4 to 5 on the mohs scale of hardness. Polishes best with tin oxide or diamond.


