

OMYA MINE FIELD TRIP

The Omya field trip will take place Saturday, October 30th.

We plan to start about 7:00 pm at the Omya plant in Lucerne Valley.

Howard Brown will make a presentation about the geology and the rocks and the rules for about 30 minutes or so (while it gets dark), then we will go up to the quarry for collecting. It could go until 10 pm at the latest.

People need to dress accordingly, sturdy shoes, it could be cold and windy, or nice, who knows?

If you have hard hats bring them, if not we can provide. we would prefer no children under 6 especially at night.

Cars can make it to the quarry, but we prefer SUV or pickup truck. Bring short wave ultraviolet light and flashlight.

Directions to Omya plant in Lucerne Valley

Highway 18 east to Lucerne Valley. The road will fork in "downtown"

Lucerne Valley. Bear right (highway 18) towards Big Bear, and go 1/4 mile to the stop sign at Crystal Creek road. Turn right and head up the hill to the plant. The Omya plant is the first limestone plant in Lucerne Valley. We will meet at the Admin. Building on the right when you enter the plant area.

The trip is limited to the first 20 people who sign up at the club.

Instructions for participants:

Park in the parking lot of the Omya administration building at the plant. Rest rooms will be available at the plant.

Long pants and sturdy closed toed shoes are a requirement for the quarry tour

Hard hats and eye protection will be required. Omya can provide hard hats and eye protection for those who do not have them.

October weather could range from sunny and cool to windy and cold. Depending on the weather that day, I would recommend bringing a jacket.

We will gain approximately 3000 feet in elevation going to the quarry from the plant and correspondingly lose about 5 degrees in temperature. With no sun to warm you up, it can get chilly in a hurry.

Transportation at the mine: OMYA has a few vehicles to transport us out to the Quarry, however, if you have a vehicle that can handle rougher roads then a car, and are willing to drive it out to the mine, please let us know.
