General Meeting Minutes January 28, 2014

Cyndy Mandell mentioned the fair grounds want us at the fair again. They want us to participate in the judging. Cyndy has invited Jennifer from the fair to the next Board meeting to fill us in on what they want us to do. Please attend the meeting if you're interested in this. Terry Booth stated we have new blades for this year. Let's be gentle with them. Debbie Berresford is working really hard on organizing the scrapbooks. Corey Beck asked for a new wagon master. Anyone interested talk with Corey. Cyndy Mandell said the newsletter was mailed out early this month and she is still requesting for others to submit articles. Brett Ward made more flyers for the tailgate, sign up sheet for 2 hr blocks in the food tent will be posted for volunteers. Rock donation bucket is set up. Need volunteers for the silent auction. Charles Toles and Ed Deren will help with the silent auction. Need people to ask for donations. Bring baked goods to the club by 7:30 am. We will leave at 8:30 am. Michael Fosse will help handle the money in the food tent. Ceci will help cook food again this year. Discussion took place on 2015 dues increase and concerns about Kaman renewing their lease, what we are doing with the \$130,000 in savings. Candee Paredes asked would the board present information to the general membership regarding the changes with Kaman's contract and details of past contracts. The Board is obligated to inform the general membership of this kind of information. Suggestion was made to move \$400 from Building Maintenance to CFMS dues.

Board Meeting Minutes February 4, 2014

Corev Beck alerted Jim Fosse that lifetime members received a card asking for dues. Jim Fosse will look at correcting this for next time. Jim Fosse is still entering data for 2014. Lois Papner read Carole McMichael's treasurer notes and answered questions. Discussion ensued on explaining the CFMS dues that is paid on the 2013 members of 245 members. We paid \$490 for dues and \$1470 for insurance. We don't need to change the budget as the general meeting had suggested. Lois Papner is waiting for 1099 forms to be sent to us. She'll give those to Quinn our CPA and try to get our money back however the numbers are short and do not know if we'll get all of our \$584. We got back the IRS fine of \$545. We also got the QuickBooks refund back of \$230.32. Jennifer Monter spoke to us regarding the fair. She wants us to encourage members to exhibit at the fair. They had 9 entries last year in the lapidary category and they want more entries in the fair. It cost \$2 to enter the fair competition. We will be limited on only one wall between the doors. The wall where the Pups were will not be allowed for our use because of fire codes. The electricity is being fixed. We need to shut down during the pie and salsa judging. Someone does have to be at the booth until 10 pm.

It costs us approximately \$40,000 a year to run our club, (just the basics) \$30,000 of which comes **from the rental.** We try to make up the other \$10,000 in our Tailgate, dues, shop fees, interest on savings, and a few sales here and there and a rock auction or two. In recent years, it's getting harder and harder for the club to operate. Everything has gone up. Taxes, insurance, and costs of utilities, postage, everything! The only thing that HASN'T gone up is our dues and our shop fees. **SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT SERIOUSLY IN THE FUTURE.**

Can that "Big Money" be spent? Of course it can if the members approve it after being properly notified of the date to vote on the spending..but..how will we replace it in today's economy? What makes us think we could build up another sizeable reserve in the future? Our dues income takes care of less that 8% of our annual expense. How will we pay for the other 92% of expenses if we have no reserve to fall back on? That "Big Money" we all wonder about <u>IS</u> <u>OUR EMERGENCY FUND</u>, though small, we'd like to keep it for reserve "just in case". Hopefully the Gem club that started in 1947 (67 years ago) will continue for another 67 years. With careful spending, good Boards of Director's and planning for the future – I believe it will! My fellow member...Please guard that "Big Money" for the future of the club.

WHAT ABOUT our "Big Money" IN THE BANK? BY CAROLE MCMICHAEL

I have been asked, this month by two separate Board Members on two separate occasions..."what is the "**Big Money**" everyone talks about?

First of all, though it seems to be a lot, it is **actually very little** in the big scheme of things. Without renting the building in front of the clubhouse, or a serious building repair, we would use up those funds in less than 4 years – then what would become of the club? Just one major improvement like a roof repair, parking area resurface, air conditioner or heating system, could cost us thousands of dollars and take a big bite out of those funds.

I've been at the club nearly 20 years, I think – we came here in '94 and joined shortly after that. Even back then we had a sizeable savings. The money was left over from the sale of some property that a member donated with the intent of us building our club on it. A new board came along and decided to sell that property, on Bear Valley Road, because the price had gone up, and buy the property we are on today. The Board and members back then planned ahead and wanted the building in front to be rented to HELP support the club. (It supports 75% of the club's costs today). Each year, as the club was careful with it's spending and as generous members donated their time to do repairs and maintenance around the clubhouse and the rental money was added to that original sum and it grew each year with interest at 5% until is what is today. I remember when we were earning about \$5,000 a year just in interest on our money. In the past we could add from \$5,000 to \$8,000 a years to our savings account. Not any more!!! We have earned less than \$365 in the last six months on the "Big Money" so it isn't growing very fast. That loss of interest has been a huge loss to the club

As you may or may not know, without renting our building for at least \$2300.00 a month, we could not operate our club at all! If we were to lose our renter for any reason, we would HAVE TO remodel and repaint and do some major fixing up in order to rent the building to a new client (**IF WE COULD** even find a new client) Remember.. it is NOT in a very good location, which is getting worse year after year with age and the deterioration of the
