
THE MINERAL OF THE MONTH

Grossular Garnets can be collected in Lucerne Valley, CA. Grossularite (or grossular) garnet is a calcium-aluminum garnet. Grossularite varies in hardness from 6.5 to 7.5 on the Mohs hardness scale. The best specimens of grossularite can easily be confused with the more expensive demantoid garnet. An everyday use of this mineral is in sandpaper as an abrasive. Garnets are January's birthstone.

They are always at the meeting They stay until it's through -The ones that I would mention Are the always faithful few.


They fill the many offices And are always on the spot No matter what the weather Though it may be awful hot.

ELMER PIERCY VICTOR VALLEY GEM AND MINERAL CLUB'S FOUNDING FATHERS

We were very lucky to have two of the Piercy grandchildren here representing one of our founding fathers' Elmer Piercy. Linda Piercy pictured with the lovely stone her father had made called our club asking for help in making it into a necklace for her sister. Her name rang a bell for me and I asked her if she was any relation to Elmer Piercy. We she told me that it was her husband grandfather and I couldn't have been more excited. I invited them to our Christmas Party and they told us some wonderful stories about Elmer.

Elmer was born February 14, 1904, in Canton, Ohio. He was one of eight children and his father worked in the underground coal mines. On the morning of November 6, 1918, Elmer life was changed when his father was killed in a mine roof fall. Elmer at the age of fourteen, became the breadwinner for the family. Elmer had played for his schools' basketball team, but had to quit so that he could work before and after school to help his mother. Elmer had a strong work ethic and finished high school in 1922. Elmer did not work in the coal mines but worked for the A & P Company warehouse for two years. In 1924 Elmer joined the Navy and was sent to radio school in Great Lake, Illinois. Upon finishing radio school and knowing he was going to be assigned to a ship, Elmer married his high school sweetheart Lurlan Ann Phillips in 1925.

Lurlan moved to Long Beach, California to be at Elmer's homeport. In 1928 Elmer was discharged from the Navy. This was the start of the Great Depression and work was hard to find. Lurlan was a nurse and found work at a well-baby clinic. Elmer worked several manual labor jobs, including ditch digger, during that time. (TO BE CONTINUED NEXT MONTH)

THE BEAD BUNCH


