Can you believe it? Victor Valley Gem and Mineral Club is half way through its 70th year! How amazing is that?

VVGMC has a long and rich history dating as far back as 1941, until the "fifteen Rock-nuts" as the then "Victor Press" deemed the founding members, formally incorporated in May 1947.

The club members went from meeting in homes, schools, parks or wherever they could find a place to eventually in 1952 purchasing our current site for the grand sum of \$1,500. A year later they bought the adjoining lot for \$10,000 through rummage sales, raffles, bake sales, etc. to establish the building fund. They even sold wrecked cars and parts in order to contribute to the

fund.

There were originally 2 bungalows that were bought from the school district and joined together to make the clubhouse holding their grand opening on September 1, 1961.

The following year in 1962 officials of the "Victor Press" had ground breaking ceremonies for the large commercial building in front of the club. They leased the building for the next 10 years followed by Kaman Bearing who has leased the building since.

Over the years our club has had many distinguishing awards and recognitions from "Most spectacular gem and mineral exhibit in the state" to "All American Club" recognized by the American Federation of Mineralogical

Societies for being one of the most outstanding clubs in the nation. Even last year we had several Petrified Pups from the youth program who one first place, second place and best in show for their handiwork at the San Bernardino County Fair.

A memorable quote from one of our Past Presidents, Elmer Rehme, on the occasion of the "Burn the Mortgage" dinner in 1974 that still rings true today, "let's celebrate and show our appreciation for the efforts of those good people who had a part in founding, building, and continuing the work. Their names and foresight should not be forgotten. Our building and property is a monument for the future generations of rockhounds to use and enjoy."

Rock of the Month Feature: Calcite



Calcite is a rock-forming mineral with a chemical formula of CaCO₃ and is a three on the Mohs scale of hardness and that makes it suitable as a low-hardness abrasive. It is extremely common and found throughout the world in sedimentary, metamorphic, and igneous

rocks. Some geologists consider it to be a "ubiquitous mineral" - one that is found everywhere.

Calcite is the principal constituent of limestone and marble. These rocks are extremely common and make up a significant portion of Earth's crust. They serve as one of the largest carbon repositories on our planet.

The properties of calcite make it one of the most widely used minerals. It is used as a construction material, abrasive, agricultural soil treatment, construction aggregate, pigment, pharmaceutical and more. It has more uses than almost any

other mineral.

Limestone is a sedimentary rock composed primarily of calcite. It forms from both the chemical precipitation of calcium carbonate and the transformation of shell, coral, fecal and algal debris into calcite during diagenesis. Limestone also forms in caves from the precipitation of calcium carbonate. Calcite is an amazing mineral. There are so many uses from marble statues to antacids and paint to a white colored dust that adheres to the walls of coal mines to immobilize the coal dust. 
