Rock of the Month: Azurite

Azurite is a soft, deep blue copper mineral produced by weathering of copper ore deposits. It is also known as Chessylite after the locality at Chessyles Mines near Lyons, France. The blue azurite is exceptionally deep and clear, and for that reason the mineral has tended to be associated since antiquity with the deep blue color of low-humidity desert and winter skies.

Azurite is one of the two basic copper carbonate mineral, the other being bright green malachite. Simple copper carbonate is not known to exist in nature. Small crystals of azurite can be produced by rapidly stirring a few

drops of copper sulfate solution into a saturated solution of sodium carbonate and allowing the solution to stand overnight.



Azurite crystals are monoclinic. Large crystals are dark blue, often prismatic. Specimens can be massive to nodular. They are often stalactitic in form and tend

to lighten in color over time due to weathering of the specimen surface into malachite. Azurite is soft, with a Mohs hardness of only 3.5 to 4. Azurite is destroyed by heat, losing carbon dioxide and water to form black.

Azurite is unstable in open air compared to malachite, and is pseudomorphically replaced by malachite.

Shop Talk with Ruben Martinez

This month will be a short article on saw room safety and procedures.

- Sign-in on door and let instructor know what your plans are.
- 2. Everyone must be certified to use a saw. It's the instructor's responsibility to check the certification book and if you haven't yet been certified, be sure you are before you use the equipment.
- 3. The first thing I scan when I'm going into the saw room is the floor looking for oil and spills. Whenever rocks, saws, oil and members come together it gets messy. Let's all try to make a little more effort to clean up the small spills. At the
- end of the day, several small spills make a big spill and then it becomes a slip and fall hazard. A little effort to clean-up goes a long way. Be a good example for other club members. If you are an intrepid saw user, you are being watched by others. So next time you step into the saw room ask vourself if vou're teaching them good habits or not.
- 4. Eye safety: Safety glasses are a must, no exceptions! Instructors, it's your job to insist or the room becomes a no-go zone, as should be the rule for the grinding and silver rooms as well. If you don't have safety

- glasses, Harbor Freight and Home Depot have a variety to choose from, be a trend-setter.
- 5. Evacuation Fan: Before you open the lid to check your saw or move your rock, turn on the evacuation fan, you don't want the oil and rock particulate matter in the air in your lungs. You are your best advocate for your health and safety.
- 6. As for saw operating procedures, that is your instructor of the day's job. Listen, learn, ask questions, don't be shy. Any malfunctions or spills, let the instructor know immediately.
- Sign-Off on the door and let the instructor know you are finished before leaving.
