is a great start to what we hope is another long relationship with the San Bernardino County Fair. Think GEM SHOW 2019.



Rock of the Month: General Mineral Information

Every person uses products made from minerals every day. The salt that we add to our food is the mineral halite. Antacid tablets are made from the mineral calcite.

The cars that we drive, the roads that we travel, the buildings that we live in, and the fertilizers used to produce our food are all made using minerals. In the United States, about three trillion tons of mineral commodities are consumed each year to support the standard of living of 300 million citizens. That is about ten tons of mineral materials consumed for every person, every year.

To meet the definition of "mineral" used by most geologists,

a substance must meet five requirements:

- naturally occurring
- inorganic
- solid
- definite chemical composition
- ordered internal structure "Naturally occurring" means that people did not make it. Steel is not a mineral because it is an alloy produced by people.

"Inorganic" means that the substance is not made by an organism. Wood and pearls are made by organisms and thus are not minerals. "Solid" means that it is not a liquid or a gas at standard

temperature and pressure.

"Definite chemical composition" means that all occurrences of that mineral have a chemical composition that varies within a specific limited range. For example: the mineral halite (known as "rock salt" when it is mined) has a chemical composition of NaCl. It is made up of an equal number of atoms of sodium and chlorine. "Ordered internal structure" means that the atoms in a mineral are arranged in a systematic and repeating pattern. Halite is composed of an equal ratio of sodium and chlorine atoms arranged in a cubic pattern.

Shop Talk with Ruben Martinez

First of all let's give credit where it's due then we can move on with the subject at hand "A Touch of Solder" As a matter of mere circumstance I happened to pick up a copy of a March 1985 issue of Rock and Gem yesterday and read an article by Gerry Blair under the heading of SHOP TALK. The lightening bulb in my head went on and thus a feature in The Bulletin is born; me and my big mouth.

It gives me a great deal of satisfaction when I am fabricating and soldering a new piece, but as the article suggests; "every person who has heated a piece of metal has had good soldering days and bad soldering days. The thing is, the bad solder days are like grapes. They tend to come in bunches" And that would certainly apply to yours truly.

As I read the article, the

realization that I related all to well caused me to consider that there are many of us at the club who also can relate.

This is Gerry's article: "Most of us experienced metal workers can spot the start of a bad solder day early on. We are adding one last tiny decoration to rich Aunty Audrey's pendant when we get the torch tip a bit too close to the gallery wire made to hold the main stone and it melts. Or we are torching a complicated inlay framework and half of the pieces stick and half don't. Rational inspection, usually provides a logical explanation for the lack of soldering success. Here are some soldering basics I review periodically to keep me somewhat sane.

Most soldering failures occur because of unclean metal. Use fine steel

wool, sandpaper, or a file to remove surface oxidation. Use warm soapy water or alcohol to remove grease and oil.

Many solder failures occur because the joint is not tight. Solder will not fill a sloppy fit.

Some soldering failures happen because the flux used is weak, improperly applied, or the wrong type. Be sure the flux matches the metal.

A few solder failures are because of improper torching. Apply the heat to the part to be joined and heat each part equally. If you do not, the solder will rush to the hot spot and will ignore the less-hot spot."

If you struggle, ask an experienced instructor or we'll jump onto "You Tube" and figure it out together. Happy Soldering!


