**Garnet** is the birthstone of January. Although many people think of a red gem when they think of garnet, it is actually available in almost every color - green (tsavorite and demantoid), orange (spessartine and hessionite), purple (rhodolite), yellow (mali and topazolite), pink (malaya), red (almandine and pyrope), black (melanite). These are just some of garnet's many colors and varieties. There are even opaque garnets that are usually cut as a **cabochon** (pink hydrogrossular and green grossularite). The color variety of garnet gives people born in January many color options.

## Rocks

The scientific term for rocks is petrology, and understanding them is crucial for understanding the formation and mineral makeup of the earth. Rocks are made from minerals and can come in every size: They can be tiny pebbles or mountains big enough on which to climb or drive. Rocks do not have a special chemical or mineral makeup. While most rocks are not cut or polished to be used as gemstones, some rocks, including lapis lazuli, are classified as gems.





## **PUTA SPIN ON YOUR WORK**

Often when we're soldering or annealing, we need to reach the piece from several angles. An easy way to deal with this is to mount the solder pad or the annealing pan on a turntable. And this saves a lot of time when you're soldering multiple pieces. Arrange 6-8 of them around the outside of the pad and rotate each piece into position for soldering.

All you need to make one of these is an inexpensive turn table assembly from a good hardware store or online from Amazon. Simply mount your annealing pan on the turntable or make a holder for your solder pad out of some thin aluminum sheet.

In building this turntable for my 6 inch square solder pad, I used a seven inch square piece of aluminum and cut out 1/2 inch notches from each corner. Then I used a vice to bend the sides along the dotted lines to form a tray that cradles the solder pad. A couple 1/4" long 6-32 machine screws and nuts attach the tray to the turntable.
