Scott Gray. Do you have more rocks than you know what to do with like I do? Are you always looking for another on or four to add to your

horde, also just like me? Then hopefully you participated in the December Field trip to Diamond Pacific in Barstow to dig thru the tons of rough they have in their "rock yard" behind the main building. The Diamond Pacific Rock Yard is a popular pace with rock hounds and specifically, with VVGMC members. Amazingly this was the first time I

had actually made this specific trip, always missing out over past trips for one reason or another. Glad I made it this time! With a huge back lot containing 55 gallon drums cut in half that are overflowing with everything from obsidian and rhodonite to petrified wood and Brazilian agates this is the place to be if you're a rock nut. At \$3.00 a pound for anything you find, many a bargain can be had. A collector with a keen eye can easily find material worth considerably more than the asking price. I found some lovely moss agates, good quality palm root, and a huge Montana Moss. Blaine and Jude Witte showed m the technique for hunting here: browse the barrels surface picking until you run into on that has a few pieces of something you really like and empty

The Desert Gardens International Rock And Gem Show runs from January 1st thru February 28th, Tyson Wells Rock And Gem Show is January 5th thru the 14th, and The Quartzsite Pow Wow Gem And Mineral Show is January 17th thru the 21st. Most rockhounds center their visit around the Pow Wow but all the shows have great stuff to offer; we actually like Desert Gardens the best. January 13, 2024 The first field trip of 2024 will be on Saturday January 13th to club favorite Kramer Hills for quartz family gemstones: agate, jasper, petrified palm bog, and small agate amygdule's. Meet up will be at 9am at the Burger King parking lot at Kramer junction south of the Hwy 395 / Hwy 58 intersection. High clearance vehicles preferred; bring your bucket, spray bottle, a shovel, a rock pick, and

good walking shoes; the amygdule location entails a short hike down a low grade slope and another couple hundred yards over more or less level ground. See ya there!

Amygdule, secondary deposit of minerals found in a rounded, <u>elongated</u>, or almondshaped cavity in <u>igneous rock</u>. The cavities (vesicles) were created by the expansion of gas bubbles or steam within <u>lava</u>. Some amygdule's consist partially of lava, which indicates their formation during solidification of the <u>rock</u>. Since gas bubbles tend to rise through the lava, amygdule's are most common near the tops of flows. The secondary minerals may form after the solidification of the lava; the gases may help to form the filling minerals. A great variety of minerals have been found as amygdules, including some spectacular mu-

Knapping is the shaping of <u>flint</u>, <u>chert</u>, <u>obsidian</u>, or other <u>conchoidal fracturing</u> stone through the process of <u>lithic reduction</u> to manufacture <u>stone tools</u>, strikers for <u>flintlock</u> firearms, or to produce flat-faced stones for building or facing walls, and <u>flushwork</u> decoration.

GARNET BIRTHSTONE MEANING & HISTORY

The name "garnet" originates from the medieval Latin *granatus*, meaning "pomegranate," in reference to the similarity of the red color. Garnets have been used since the Bronze Age as gemstones and abrasives. Necklaces studded with red garnets adorned the pharaohs of ancient Egypt. Signet rings in ancient Rome featured garnet intaglios that were used to stamp the wax that secured important documents. The clergy and nobility of the Middle Ages had a preference for red garnets.

Garnet is actually a group of several minerals. Five of these – pyrope, almandine, spessartine, grossular and andradite – are important as gems. Pyrope and almandine range from purple to red. Spessartine is found in exciting oranges and yellows, while andradite is mostly yellow to green (the gem variety demantoid). Grossular may have the widest range, from colorless through yellow to reddish orange and orangy red, as well as a strong vibrant green called

tsavorite.

Looking around on Amazon we found lots of other flint knapping books and also tool kits. The books sell for around \$22.00 to \$59.95 for others. Tool kits on the other hand are a little more pricey. Ranging from \$40.00 to over

\$225.00. We are hoping that Mike Humineck, January 7, 2024's Education night speaker will give us some hints on doing it on the cheap and or a recommended kit for beginners. Below are some flint knapping methods.



1. **Abrasion**: Raking, or abrasion, is the process of using an abrader or grinding stick to remove micro flakes from the edges of small chunks of flint, known as bifaces or nodules. This technique requires excellent control and focus on completing fine detail

your arrowhead or tool face.

work, such as crafting fishing lures or flintlocks for classic musket firearms.
2. Percussion flaking: This technique effectively removes large flake around the shape of your projectile point or Clovis arrowhead. Traditional flintknappers used antler tines as soft hammers to break large flakes from the

edge of stone spalls. 3. **Pressure flaking**: When working stone with this technique, you can use specialized flintknapping tools like a palm pad or Ishi stick. An Ishi stick is a small cylinder of wood with a sharp metal point attached to one end.
