FIELD TRIP REPORTS FROM WAGON MASTER SCOTT GRAY

TRI-COLOR AT THE TAILGATE! By Scott Gray

The weekend of March 8th-10th was the Annual VVGMC tailgate with Saturday the 9th being the yearly trip to the Tri-color Marble Quarry for the popular green collectible stone.

Friday was a busy day at the tailgate, setting up a display of rocks from previous field trips at various locations in the Mojave Desert. People marveled at some of the treasures found, especially the variety of rocks from the Yermo site. Then time running the booth with my wife Sasha, and signing up several attendees for the following days field trip. Those who did sign up seemed excited for the following morning's trip.

Saturday morning started with me perusing the list of attendees: a modest amount of rockhounds for a tough to reach site. Unbeknownst to me there was a veritable army of field trippers waiting along Stoddard Wells Rd waiting to sign in! After picking my jaw up off the ground I got busy, with help from Brett Ward, signing all these eager rockhounds up on the check in sheet. It's a lousy road getting to the quarry, sadly many of those attempting the trip did not have vehicles that could handle the horrible road. However, rockhounds being the friendly bunch that we are, many made room in their vehicles so nearly everyone who wanted to go was able to get a ride. I had every spare seat available filled as did several others. Soon thereafter we rolled out 22 4WD jeeps and trucks in total.

After the short sandy stretch at the beginning of the Jeep road the trip became a lot slower as drivers negotiated the rough road at their own pace. More than once my ears buzzed with the probable curses from some of the drivers behind me. This was later confirmed by some of those drivers at the sight! Upon approaching the canyon's entrance I quickened my pace to get further ahead of the pack and park as deep into the quarry as room would allow and then jogged back down the road to run traffic control. This ended up being the biggest challenge of the day: getting everyone into an area with practically nowhere to park or turn around! Somehow we made it work, although some of those attending had a longer walk to the main collecting area

The quarry, Hillis Quarry to be exact, is definitely a place where it does not take long to load up on a quantity of choice material. The marble, actually a metamorphosed and later brecciated Dolomite, is found in shades of green, black, white, and rarely pinks and yellows, the marble is plentiful and varied in the patterns it contains. Many of the patterns lend themselves to larger ornamental items like bookends or spheres; specimens can also be found that have smaller patterns that lend themselves to cabs and tumbling projects. Everyone attending had no problem finding material to their liking; one rockhound brought a jackhammer and another was able to take home a single huge chunk: destined to become 2 or three spheres. I even filled up a bucket to later be dumped out at the Tailgate exclusively for any who may have been late or unaware of the trip. With about 40 folks in total, including members from The Yucca Valley Club, and Temecula Gold Prospectors, and some who traveled from as far as Los Angeles and San Diego this year's trip was a success. Check out those pictures and I think you will agree!

Extra thanks goes out to Dave Duncan for the gracious use of his 4WD to enable to lead the trip again this year, and to Brett Ward for helping with the sign in process and keeping the masses waiting patiently and helping folks find rides with other attendees who otherwise wouldn't have been able to make the trip. 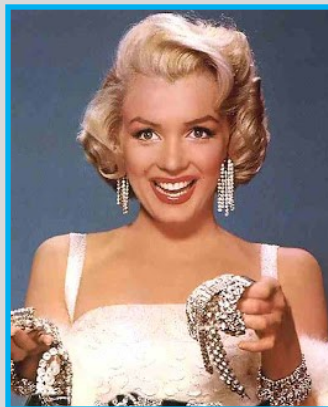


As told through the Encarta, Sanskrit texts dating back before 400 B.C. found that people associated significant value and wonderment with crystals. APRIL 14TH, 2024'S FIELD TRIP, By Scott Gray, Wagonmaster

The VVGM field trip for April will be to the North Edwards area for travertine onyx at the Sierra Pelona Travertine Claim and for jasper, jasp-agate, and with luck some petrified palm root and petrified reeds at Castle Butte.

High clearance vehicles required for both locations. Digging will be required at the travertine location to acquire large chunks so be sure to bring a shovel and a spray bottle to clean your pieces you dig up; the digging is fairly easy.

At Castle Butte, material is found in float so bring all your regular collecting equipment: rock hammer, bag or bucket, and again a spray bottle. Castle Butte has tons of average material but there is a variety of different material found there and nice pieces can be found if the effort is put in and with some luck too!

The Meet-up spot will be April 14, 2024 at 9:00am. Get an early start. It will be at the following location. Sunshine Market parking lot. It is a little market on the left at 13015 Claymine Road, immediately north of highway 58.

Last photo on the immediate left is petrified palm root, reeds sample found on the pre-site inspection at Castle Butte, Sasha, Scott's wife and wire wrap specialist found it!
