



Glowing Results: A Nighttime Field Trip For Fluorescents!

For the month of December VVG&M held a field trip to the Princess Pat mine for fluorescent minerals scheelite, calcite, quartz, and wollastonite. Meeting up on the the 14th at the clubhouse (after a busy day there of cutting rocks for myself while others were working on various projects) attending members headed out for the site at about 4pm. With 14 members in tow and several vehicles this was a better turnout than we had on last years trip here. Arriving at the location at dusk everyone bundled up to stay warm and we made the 10 minute walk up to a quarry like area and waited for darkness to settle in and see what we could find. This place is loaded with fluorescent specimens, the scheelite being my personal favorite. The short wave lamps made the rounds so everyone had a turn to use one and find pieces they liked. Several stones were found that glowed orange (calcite), green (irradiated quartz), and a bright whitish blue (the scheelite) all in the same piece! As usual the red glowing wollastonite was the toughest to locate but a few nice ones were found, including one by me! Did I say it was cold? It was, and was the only downside to this trip. Late arrival Danny Sweeney from the Yucaipa showed up and made everyone jealous with his small and mighty shortwave flashlight, the highlight of the night for me, I really gotta upgrade to one of these for the next trip! We slowly made our way back to the parking area, checking rock piles, quarry walls, and even a fire pit made of fluorescent stuff.

While being a shorter (and colder!) trip those attending seemed to have a blast. New member Daniel Perez found some nice pieces on his very first field trip; Danny Sweeney and I located a huge glowing boulder that was to big to do anything but admire, I'm sure it will stay there as you would need a mule to pull it out of the ground and get it down the hill. Thanks to all who showed up and made this trip a success. A special thank you to Jake Brower for bringing this location to my attention last year and helping explore it and to Justin Zzyzx (from the Barstow Book!) and his in-depth article on WhereToFindRocks.com that explained the formation of the occurrence and the strange mining history of the Princess Pat. I couldn't have led the trip without you two! Even though you guys weren't physically there you were there in spirit! A thank you also goes out to Dave Duncan for helping run the trip and giving several members rides to and from the site. Thanks one and all!












Birth stones for the month of January

The gemstone assigned to January is garnet. This will displease many as most people believe garnets to be rather dull, dark red gems of little value and beauty. In reality, the garnet family is vast and diverse and garnets come in nearly all colours except a true blue. There exceptionally rare garnets that display colour change from teal green to reddish purple and others that display asterism (a mostly four-rayed star) or chatoyancy (a cats-eye effect). Garnets were believed to protect warriors in battle and protect against wounds in both Native American Indian cultures and during the Mediaeval period in Europe. However, if garnets just don't appeal, other birthstones that represent January are rose quartz, emerald (according to Tibetan astrology).

Knappers Corner


This month I will continue talking about flakes, and this will be mostly photos, as I am typing on my phone. Typically, a flake will be thicker on the end that contacts the tool, tapering down to a thin, sharp edge. The thick end often has part of the platform still attached, some damage from the impact or tear initiating, and a characteristic swelling shape. This is called the Bulb of Percussion (pressure flakes have similar characteristics).

The thin end is the flake Termination.

Only flakes that cross more than half the width of the piece will thin the piece, and these are termed "thinning flakes". Flakes that don't go at least halfway across the piece merely reduce width. It is preferable to trade a loss of width for increased thinness.

Next month I hope to discuss how to promote longer flakes, and in the new year I hope to take you with me on my personal journey as I begin to learn a rigorous but potentially beautiful technique - FOG knapping.
