

The trip out to Lavic in December was a pretty good success. We had about 14 people show up and we went out to 3 different sites. We found some fantastic jaspers and agates in abundance. Sorry about not getting afield trip together for January. The Lead Mountain trip isn't coming together yet. Weather got in the way of another scouting trip in December. I'm going to have to put that one on the back burner for now I guess.

I was able to get out to the North Edward's area a few weeks ago for a scout trip out there. I'm planning a fieldtrip out there for February. We'll be going out to an onyx claim first. Bring along your shovel and pick for that one. There is a limited amount of float material for those that don't have heavier equipment. Then well go out to the Castle Butte area to collect. There are several spots there where you can collect a large variety of agate, chalcedony and jasper including petrified wood, palm wood, palm root and champanite. After this we will pick up a few sites that close to gather on the way out of the area. We found a very interesting material I'm going to call a flint. The color tended more to gray and beige when cut but what nice pattern and it took a fantastic polish. We also found some banded opalite. The area is also know to produce large pieces of petrified logs. That's not as abundant and you will have to dig to find it.

Bring lots of water, lunch, spay bottles, your rock hammer and safety goggles. Also bring you shovel and pick if you want to dig. We'll meet at the same parking lot we did for the Kramer's Corner trip, between the Road House Cafe and to the Jack in the Box on the 395 just before highway 58 at 8 AM, Saturday, February 20th.

ROCK OF THE MONTH

This months rock is going to be Charoite

Charoite (K(Ca; Na)2Si4O10(OH; F)·H2O) is a rare mineral, first described in 1978 and named for the Chara River. It has been reported only from the Sakha Republic, Yakutia, Siberia, Russia. It is found where a syenite, the Murunskii Massif, has intruded into and altered limestone deposits producing a potassium feldspar metasomatite.

Charoite is translucent lavender to purple in color with a pearly luster. However, it is a discrete mineral rather than a rock. Charoite is strictly massive in nature, and fractures are conchoidal. It has an unusual swirling, fibrous appearance, sometimes chatoyant, and that, along with its intense color, can lead many to believe at first that it is synthetic or enhanced artificially.

Though reportedly discovered in the 1940s, it was not known to the outside world until its description in 1978. It is said to be opaque and unattractive when found in the field, a fact that may have contributed to its late recognition. Charoite is used as an ornamental stone and sometimes a gemstone, generally as cabochons set into pendants.[citation needed]

Charoite occurs in association with tinaksite and canasite

Charoite is known for its primal power. It is a mineral, an unusual of rare occurrence, in the monoclinic crystal system. An opaque gemstone having a wild and swirling pattern of interlocking crystals. The colors, ranges from bright lavender, violet and lilac to that of dark purple, with white, gray and black veining.

It is believed that it is an all-round healer and works through, mainly, the immune system. Putting charoite under the pillow is said to release the fears that surface in dreams. The yoga guru claims this stone fosters a synthesis between the heart and the crown chakra. It helps to walk on spiritual path with awareness and manifests soul's wisdom and light in daily life.

Charoite occurs only in the Chara River area of Siberia. It is said that it might have been named after the Russian word Chary, which means "charms" or "magic." Charoite was first discovered in the year 1947 by Russian and the West came to know by 1978. The safest cleanser for Charoite is warm soapy water and is used for making exquisite jewelry items.

Pliers (called Breaker or Grazer \$7.00 to \$26.00) I recommend the Delphi Dragon 6" Running Pliers @ 10.00.

I will have available a variety of glass, cutting oil, thinfire shelf paper, paint, glastac, decals, frit, confetti, spirals, stringers, molds, and other supplies as needed. You may purchase these items from me or order them in advance from Delphi or any other sources. While my prices will be reasonable, meaning I will charge what it cost me to buy the item, Fused Glass is an expensive hobby with the glass being the most expensive item. You will be making small pendants and the cost of supplies should run you around \$20.00 to \$25.00 approximately depending on how many items you make. This estimate is based on three to four pieces and again this is an approximate estimate it could be less.
