

A Recent field trip - With our wagon Master-Blaine Witte.

We had a small group of 8 people that showed up to go to the Palos Verde barite trip on August 13. Unfortunately 2 of our members had to turn back at the start and didn't make the trip. Traffic was decent on the way out. When we got there we made a brief stop at the San Vincente County park and Visitor Center next to our collecting area. The Visitor Center was a fun surprise. It was fairly new and didn't exist when I lived in this area almost 30 years ago. It was a like a small museum and tourist shop rolled up in one. When we finished our little tour of the Visitor Center one of the staff was outside of the center pointing out a couple of blue whales just off the coast that were feeding. It was worth the trip just to see that.

We got back to our cars and re-parked closer to the trail down to the rock beach below the cliffs. The trail was wide and well traveled but fairly steep. At the beach we began our search. We found gypsum crystals in abundance right off the bat. Terry Booth collected a fair amount of it. Then we started to find signs of barite but it was worn by the surf. We found some interesting metamorphic material. I was the only one to save a piece but there was a lot of it there. Then Judy and I scrambled up the slope below the cliff to a pile of rubble we noticed. There we found some exceptionally nice delicate barite crystals on the surface of sand stone that made up much of the rubble. We collected enough to share with everybody in our party. We also found some interesting sedimentary rocks there as well. We didn't have so much luck with the whale bone or black coral that can also be found there. All and all not that much material was collected but that was probably a good thing. The hike back up the trail was quite a challenge for some of us as it was really steep. One the way up Debbie Socool found a nice piece of barite about the size of a golf ball that resembled a rose.

After this we went on a scouting expedition to find the old barite quarry. It turned out that we were quite close to it but that it seems to be turned in to a Nature Reserve and the roads into it have been blocked. Its possible that we might be able hike into the area but I'm not sure what the rules are for collecting and it was getting later than I wanted to be there so we left that behind.

After this we all went back to Ports of Call in nearby San Pedro to get lunch at one of my old hang outs. It had changed ownership and wasn't the same cafe I had known but it was still fun. Then we all took off and found our different ways home. I don't think any one was disappointed even though we didn't find all we were hoping to. Everyone got some nice specimens of barite and gypsum for their mineral collections. We saw blue whales. We beat the heat (kind of). And had good fellowship.

The metamorphic rock I collected I cut open the next day at the club. It wasn't exactly what I expected but it was nice. A very interesting gemmy brown, brachia like material. Still haven't figured out what to call it though. Those at the club that had been on the trip regretted that didn't snag a piece. Oh well, Next time. If we do this again we'll have experience and knowledge on our side. 5
