



Club Field Trips

The weather was in the mid to low 50's but the sky was blue and mostly clear. Any ways, as promised, those who went were able to easily fill there bags with lots of material including agate, petrified palm and reed. Most of the material was small but one of the members pulled out a chunk of agate that might of weighted 80 or so pounds. Another chuck of agate with a face that was covered with drusy (?) guartz that was probably over 200 pounds was finally abandoned when they finally realized nobody had room left in their vehicles to transport it out. We did find some smaller chunks of petrified wood with lots of wood grain and bark showing that I hadn't seen in my scouting trip. It seemed like everyone had a great time.

Our next trip is scheduled for May 14th out to Gephart Road near Boron. This is the road you take to get to the borax mine. I have located five sites in that area that are all fairly close. We can find colorful agate, chalcedony, jasper, black agate, common opal, quartz and agate nodules, chert and honey onyx.



Lapidary Scholarships

This year we had a near record of approximately 15 scholarship applications, and nearly every student was more than qualified to receive a



scholarship. It was probably the most difficult time I've had in choosing who to recommend. Students applied from UC Riverside, CSU-San Bernardino, CSU-Fullerton, CSU-Long Beach, CSU-Fresno, UC-Santa Barbara, UC-Santa Cruz, Stanford, and Sonoma State. It was the first application we've ever received from many of these schools. I will be bringing the applications to the rest of the committee for final decision shortly, and the Board will be notified at the May meeting.

There has been some talk of decreasing the scholarship money and/ or diverting funds recently. However, based on the quality of applicants we have been receiving the past several years, the diversity of colleges applying, and the overall need due to the economy, I don't think this is a very practical idea.

In fact, more than 2 students probably deserved it this year. Additionally, I received a note from a professor at Sonoma State who said, "I have seen your scholarship announcements for quite a few years and I am impressed that you continue to reward students in geology with much needed financial support." Another professor stated, " I hope the Scholarship Committee will consider that (our college) need to help our society by supporting students who are going to go out and help professionally." I believe these statements to be a glowing endorsement of the work our club continues to do each year.
