

Especially For Sphere Cutters

A problem encountered by some sphere cutters is rust on iron sphere cubes. A remedy is to use a mixture of eight parts water and one-part soluble oil instead of plain water as a carrier for the abrasive grit. In addition to preventing rust, the soluble oil causes the grit to adhere to the sphere for a longer period of time.

HOBBY HUNTS

Palm root can be cut at different angles to get different effect. Cutting across the roots will show the round eye with the colored center and right around it. Cutting along the root will expose a wood grain surface.

Polishing a stone all over, front, back, and edges, acts as a sealer. It seals and keeps the water in opal; it prevents natural corrosion in rhodonite (that corrodes to a black ore called wad) and it helps stop the absorption of harmful substances such as perspiration.

POLISH PROBLEMS?

Many people think of polishing as comparable to shining a shoe. Actually, each grit used on a stone leaves scratches in the surface of the stone. So, when you go to a finer grit, its purpose is to remove all the scratches from the last grit. An estimate of the depth of scratches left on the stone by each grit is:

80 grit - 2.6mm 180 grit - 0.86mm 220 grit - 0.6mm 325 grit - 0.3mm 600 grit - 0.16mm 1200 grit - 0.07mm 3000 grit - 0.03mm

With reflected light, the unaided eye can see imperfections far smaller than 0.03mm. On a cabochon, small grit scratches are hidden by surface imperfections and the stone looks shiny.

Go to the Hesperia Grange Hall, on 16685 Yucca St. (Cnr. of B and Yucca Streets).


Whiein? - The doors open at 5p.m on Saturday, December 15th.
